Battle of Franklin Illumination Saturday, November 20 Volunteers Needed and Welcome



In conjunction with Blue & Gray Days, the City of Franklin Battlefield Commission is again sponsoring the Battle of Franklin Illumination near the Confederate Cemetery. This is the fifth year the Illumination has been staged for the visiting public, and the second time in the large 4-acre open field south of the Cemetery. The display calls public attention to the memory and sacrifice of nearly 10,000 American soldiers, North and South, who became casualties during the five-hour Battle of Franklin on November 30, 1864. The idea is to light a luminary for every one of those 10,000 soldiers.

<u>Volunters</u> need to be on-site at **1:00 PM Saturday**, Nov 20 to place and light the 10,000 luminaries. We need 100 volunteers to join in the project. If you are not registered, you are still welcome to come be a part of this important community project.

<u>Volunteers</u> are also needed at **9:00 AM Friday** Nov 19th to paint the dot grid for the display. A volunteer surveying crew will outline the grid beforehand so that

40-50 volunteers using paint-cans-on-a-stick can quickly make the 10,000 dots.

This dot grid is crucial to creating the spectacular rank-and-file appearance of the Illumination field. The dots also greatly hasten the accurate placement of the luminaries.

Family groups, school groups, and Boy/Girl Scout groups are encouraged to take part. Some schools allow service credit for student participants

After set-up and lighting are completed at dusk, a commemorative ceremony will be held in the Cemetery, including period band music and speakers. The Illumination display field will remain intact for a period of reflection and photographs.

Around 6:00 PM the volunteers will extinguish the candles, gather the luminaries they set out, disassemble them, and pack the candle blocks in preparation for next year's event. The paper bags will be collected for recycling. We will finish before 7:30 PM

NPS Awards \$3 Million To Preserve 5 Battlefields— Civil War News, November 2010 — WASHINGTON, DC — The national Park Service recently awarded more than \$3 million in grants for easements and land acquisition at five endangered Civil War battlefields. The grants were from Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) monies administered by the Park Service's American Battlefield Protection Program. The matching fund grant awards are: Spring Hill Battlefield, TN., \$1.9 million; Franklin Battlefield, TN., \$492,000; Cold Harbor Battlefield, VA, \$203,000; and Richmond Battlefield, KY, \$29,500.

Civil War event a big to-do — The Tennessean — 11/7/10 — Nashville — this kickoff for the 150th Commemoration of the Civil War is the precursor to five years of focus on the Civil War in Tennessee. At the Bicentennial Mall from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Friday and Saturday, you'll find encampments, interpreters, flag presentations, music, battle reenactments and firearms demonstrations, plus the opening of the new "Tennessee Struggle for the Heartland 1861-1865" exhibit. The Tennessee State Museum will show off one of the largest Civil War collections in the nation, plus photographs and artifacts that are not usually on display. In War Memorial Auditorium starting at 8 a.m. Saturday, you can hear Civil War experts, including Carroll Van West, Carol Bucy, Tim Johnson, Sam Davis Elliot and author Robert Hicks.

Land Trust of Tennessee to receive Preservation Honor Award from National Trust for Historic Preservation — Williamson Herald e-news — 10/18/10 — **FRANKLIN** — The National Trust for Historic Preservation presented its Preservation Honor Award to The Land Trust for Tennessee, with several Williamson County residents also being recognized for their work with the organization. The award was presented to Jean Nelson, president of The Land Trust of Tennessee, at the National Preservation Awards ceremony in Austin, Texas, on Friday, Oct. 29. Co-recipients were Williamson County residents W. Ridley Wills, board member of The Land Trust and historian and former board member of the National Trust for Historic Preservation; Irene Wills, conservation easement donor of an historic landscape; and Julian Bibb, wellrecognized preservationist and former board member of The Land Trust for Tennessee.
