CWPT and **ABPP** Purchase Spring Hill **Battlefield Property**

At Rippavilla Plantation, with a large audience present on September 24, Jim Lighthizer, Civil War Preservation Trust president, announced the acquisition of 84 acres of Spring Hill battlefield land adjacent to Rippavilla. The site is where thousands

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of Confederate troops camped following the Battle of Spring Hill on Nov. 29, 1864, as Union forces crept by them in the night just yards away, setting the stage for the bloody and decisive Battle of Franklin the next day.

Civil War Preservation Trust now has a \$2 million contract to buy the land from its owners at General Motors. Zoned for possible commercial development, the land was appraised for about \$4 million. Trust President Jim Lighthizer said that a \$1.9 million federal grant through the National Park Service's American Battlefield Protection Program would help provide \$20 for every \$1 donated to CWPT to enable the deal to happen. Lighthizer will turn to the group's 55,000 members to raise the \$100,000 needed to close the sale by Nov. 29.

For years, Spring Hill's battlefield has been listed by the CWPT as an "endangered battlefield" because of its attractiveness to developers. It would be the Trust's second land purchase in Spring Hill after a purchase of about 110 acres along Kedron Road several years ago.

Roper's Knob Land is for Sale

Last year, developer Charles Mitchell was granted permission to build an access road from Mack Hatcher Parkway onto his land adjoining the north side of Roper's Knob. As we shared with you then, this road would open much of the land around the base of Roper's Knob to development. Currently the road has been cut in but is unpaved. See our website for detailed news and photos.

Now, Mitchell is seeking to sell his property as two separate parcels – a 151 acre parcel along Franklin Road and a 40 acre parcel off Mack Hatcher which is being marketed as the possible site for a corporate headquarters, a hotel or retail or other similar space. This use would require rezoning by the city.

Any such use would jeopardize the fragile terrain and slopes of Roper's Knob as well as ruin the view shed from this crucial Federal Signal Station used for communication between Nashville, Murfreesboro and Triune. The summit and south face are owned by the city and state and still has Civil War earthworks. We will continue to watch events unfold and keep you informed.

Register Now and Attend the 146th Battle of Franklin October 16 – 17, 2010

The 146th Anniversary of the Battle of Franklin & Reenactment, scheduled for 16 and 17 October is shaping up very well. The event will include battles at 1:30PM both Saturday and Sunday. Also there will be period sutlers and band, presentations and a pass in review.

This event, as part of Franklin's Civil War Days is being held at The Harlinsdale Park just north of downtown Franklin. Reenactor participation is going well and expected to continually grow up until the start of the event. By September 1st, there were over 200 pre-registrations that included almost 20 mounted cavalry and 13 artillery pieces manned by eight different batteries.

Franklin Cemeteries may earn historic status — *The Tennessean,* "Williamson A.M." — 8/25/10 — FRANKLIN — Franklin wants national historic designations for two of its oldest cemeteries — Rest Haven Cemetery and City Cemetery — in the hopes of drawing federal money to help restore them one day. Franklin planners want to pursue a Federal Preservation Grant to pay for nominating the 19th-century cemeteries to the National Register of Historic Places. Nominating the two cemeteries to the Register would cost an estimated \$4,000-\$5,000. If Franklin received the grant, the city would pay only \$1,600-\$2,000.

\$492,000 will pay down debt for land on Columbia
Ave. — The Tennessean, "Williamson A.M." —
8/20/10 — FRANKLIN — Another piece of land on
Columbia Avenue is closer to becoming part of a
proposed Battle of Franklin battlefield park. The
National Park Service confirmed this week its award of
\$492,000 to the city of Franklin for use in helping
Franklin's Charge complete the purchase of the one-acre
Holt House property off Columbia Avenue. The house

and land sit at the epicenter of the Battle of Franklin, which was fought on Nov. 30, 1864, where a cotton gin once stood. The award is part of \$977,500 given from the National Park Service this week to local governments in Franklin, Richmond, Ky., and Bentonville, N.C.

Developer toils in Texas as local project sits on hold — The Tennessean — 8/20/10 — **THOMPSON'S STATION** — Former Thompson's Station Mayor Leon Heron, developer of the mixed-use Roderick Place project, is planning to invest millions of dollars into developing a former naval base near Corpus Christi, Texas. Heron has not yet submitted a final plat to the town for the Roderick Place project, which was approved in 2006. Heron said he is exploring the possibility of working with some equity partners so that the commercial component of Roderick Place can come to fruition. This portion includes a wellness center, a 60-bed boutique inn, a restaurant and some potential retail shops.

Things to do: Blue, gray to set up camp at Harlinsdale — Williamson Herald — 9/1/10 — FRANKLIN — The Park at Harlinsdale Farm gets its first tryout as a Civil War reenactment site next month. An estimated 1,500 attendees and Civil War e-enactors are expected to use the 200-acre park Oct. 16-17 to commemorate the Battle of Franklin as part of a Civil War Days event. Visitors will be able to witness a re-enactment of the Battle of Franklin, numerous infantry camps, at least 20 mounted horses and the firing of artillery pieces, among other activities.

From tearoom to tea tent — *The Tennessean,* "Williamson A.M." — 9/5/10 — THOMPSON'S STATION — The first Sweet Tea Festival staged on the grounds of historic Homestead Manor — which includes a tearoom — drew over 5,000 attendees to Thompson's Station. There was something for everyone: Civil War era re-enactors, antique cars, food vendors, artisans, live music, a beauty pageant – and of course, plenty of tea. This family friendly event was a smashing success. Proceeds benefited nonprofit organizations including Outdoor Encounter and Thompson's Station Battlefield Park.
