It is with great sadness that we report the sudden illness and passing of STFB Board Member and good friend Bill Heyd. Our deepest expression of sympathy is extended to his family and especially to his widow, Mrs. Janice Heyd, and to their children.

Bill was a graduate of the University of Michigan, Master of Architecture and a member of AIA American Institute of Architects. Bill and Janice retired to Franklin seven years ago and Bill immediately became a serious student of local Civil War history. He was well aware of the challenges faced by the preservation community. ### Civil War Sesquicentennial License Plate Needs Your Help <u>Right Now</u>



Our friends at Tennessee Civil War Preservation Association report they are getting close to the goal of 1,000 signups for the new 150<sup>th</sup> license plate but **they** are not there yet. They also say that they are running out of time because the deadline is June 30<sup>th</sup> to have all 1,000 signups and checks collected.

They feel it is going to be a very, very close-run thing and really need your help to put it safely over the top. Please don't delay. Go to **TCWPA.org** and register for the plate. When they reach the 1,000 hurdle, they will instruct you to send in a \$35 check When you do pick up your new plate later on, this \$35 and the unused portion of your current registration will be credited against the cost of your new Civil War plate.

If you live outside of Tennessee, call all of your Tennessee friends and tell them to get off their couch and sign up. It would be absolutely tragic if TCWPA gets this close to creating a Tennessee Sesquicentennial plate, and then have it all fall short due to the folks who were counting on somebody else to carry the load. **C'mon, sign up today**.

# Lorings Advance Tour - March 17 Attracts 33 Visitors

After threats of early morning showers, a beautiful sunny day greeted 33 visitors to Franklin for a tour of Lorings Advance – a 5-acre portion of the close-in Franklin battlefield purchased last fall by the Civil War Trust and STFB. As did many before them, several visitors commented that they were old-time Franklin residents but totally surprised and pleased to see five open acres of the Franklin battlefield in the middle of town. And it is protected, too.

Eric related that 10 Federal guns were placed behind the east end of the trench line on Lewisburg Pike, or just east of it on McNutt Hill, and fired more than 1,150 rounds into the attacking Confederates. Four more guns at Fort Granger could reach the Confederates as they formed up near Carnton Plantation. The guns on McNutt Hill opened just as soon as the attack came into view, and continued their fire until after 8:00 PM. Brutal was a word Eric used often.

#### News In Review March 2012

Nashville fell to Union 150 years ago today — *The Tennessean* — 2/25/12 — NASHVILLE — The bad news reached Nashville on a Sunday morning, so scary and unexpected that church pews emptied in a flash. The Confederacy's Fort Donelson, thought invincible days before, had fallen to Union soldiers some 80 miles down the Cumberland River. So began The Great Panic, an unprecedented scramble in an unfortified city of 30,000 people, a bustling river port geographically poised to grow as a rail hub. Fearing a vicious Yankee attack, families fled, officials cowered and mobs rioted for nine days. And then, 150 years ago today, a beleaguered mayor surrendered the South's first capital city without a fight.

Williamson County tourism spending pays off tenfold — *The Tennessean*, "Williamson A.M." — 2/28/12 — FRANKLIN — Every dollar Williamson County spends luring tourists results in a tourist spending \$10 in Williamson County. That's a pretty good return, and the statistic helps tell the story of how lucrative the industry can be. Just four years ago the county saw \$6 for every \$1 spent promoting its Civil War battlefields, its shopping and its amenities for business travelers. Mark Shore, executive director of the Williamson County Convention and Visitors Bureau, says he can expand the market even further but needs a stronger investment from local government. When counting actual dollars spent, Williamson County is outpaced only by the state's biggest draws — Nashville, Memphis and the Smoky Mountains.

Franklin's Charge must raise cash to make Domino's fall — *The Tennessean*, "Williamson A.M." — 3/2/12 — FRANKLIN — Franklin's Charge is eyeing the final piece of land needed to complete a dream for historic preservationists: creation of a Civil War park on Columbia Avenue. They want a parcel that contains a Domino's Pizza restaurant and a small retail center at 1221-1225 Columbia Ave. owned by developer Donnie Cameron. Cameron is seeking \$1.85 million for the property. By May 1, Franklin's Charge must raise \$500,000 that the group needs to secure a \$250,000 grant from the Washington, D.C.-based Civil War Trust as well as a \$250,000 donation from an anonymous donor who wants to help Franklin's Charge.
