
Lotz House To Host <u>Ed Bearss</u> Dinner and Twilight Tour Thursday, August 22

Rezoning Request Threatens Battlefield We Need Your Help

The Power Spray Car Wash at 1416 Columbia Avenue could become a 7-unit apartment cluster if developer Daniel Woods is granted a rezoning request that permits it. STFB Board feels this rezoning request should be denied.

This property is on the corner of Fairground Street and is the site of the Federal Advanced Line where the first close-contact fighting at the Battle of Franklin began. A historical marker placed by STFB and the Salt Creek CWRT of Chicago some ten years ago identifies this historic place.

Woods' rezoning request asks to build 7 two-story townhouses on the .39 acres. The rezoning will increase the market value of the property and quite likely start a cascade of similar rezoning requests along Columbia Avenue – making future reclamation efforts on Columbia Avenue all that more expensive. STFB, other local preservation groups and the Civil War Trust all feel the zoning should stay as it is and any development of this property should conform to the existing zoning. This rezoning request will be presented to the full Planning Commission on Thursday, July 25 at 7:00 PM at City Hall on the Square. Please **plan to be there** to show your support for battlefield preservation. If the rezoning request were approved, the issue would then go before the full Board of Mayor and Aldermen for consideration.

A 2005 Survey of 400 Franklin Voters sponsored by the Civil War Trust reported that three-fourths of those surveyed wanted the City and its agencies to directly support Civil War Battlefield Preservation. The Planning Commission is the City's first-tier of review to avoid projects that create even greater threats to our battlefield. They need to deny this request.

Blue, Gray & Green: The Economic and Tourism Benefits of Battlefield Preservation is another very important recent study by the CWT that documents the beneficial impact that battlefield tourism brings to local business, employment, and tax collections. Quite simply, to reap the benefits of Civil War tourism, we first have to have the Civil War battlefield.

News In Review July 2013

Green space could become large park — The Tennessean–Williamson A.M. – 6/14/13 – **THOMPSON'S STATION** — Town officials tonight voted to pursue the purchase of 104 acres of farmland in the heart of Thompson's Station for public green space. The property is along Thompson's Station Road West, north of the Town Hall, and comprises much of the scenic vista behind the landmark red caboose. The town hopes to finalize its purchase after the start of the new fiscal year in July, Mayor Corey Napier said. The Board of Mayor and Aldermen tonight voted to make a \$1.15 million offer on the property, which has been appraised at more than \$1.2 million. (Editor's Note: This property was the site of intense action during the Battle of Thompson's Station, March 5, 1863).

County's mix of attractions draws tourists — The Tennessean–Franklin Review Appeal — 6/19/13 — FRANKLIN — Williamson County, the sixth top tourist destination by expenditure among 95 counties in the state, is gaining on the State's other well-known tourist draws with its rich historical and cultural sites. In 2011, tourism in Williamson County generated \$332.4 million in expenditures by visitors. That was a 12.47-percent increase from 2010. The numbers for 2012 will be out in the next few months and Mark Shore, executive director of the Williamson County Convention and Visitors Bureau, expects to see the tourism industry holding steady.

Speaker to shed light on General Hood — The Tennessean–Williamson A.M. — 7/12/13 — FRANKLIN — On July 14, The Franklin Civil War Round Table presented West Virginia's Stephen "Sam" Hood. Hood, a vigorous defender of Army of Tennessee Gen. John Bell Hood, a few months ago discovered a cache of formerly unknown Hood papers stored in the closest of a direct descendant. Sam Hood presented some of the information from his new book, *John Bell Hood - The rise, Fall and Resurrection of a Confederate General.*

More artifacts unearthed during work at battlefield — The Tennessean–Williamson A.M. — 6/20/13 **— FRANKLIN** — The Eastern Flank Battlefield Park keeps yielding secrets from the city's distant past. The items were recovered by archaeologists after workers discovered a 12-pound cannonball during the road grading for the new park entrance. Larry McKee, TRC Cos. Inc., archaeology program manager, declined to discuss specifics of what was found, citing security concerns since work on the roadway is ongoing. The New York Times taps Hicks to write Civil War editorial members — Williamson Herald— 7/2/13 — FRANKLIN — The New York Times tapped Battle of Franklin Trust board member and New York Times best-selling author Robert Hicks to write an editorial on "Why The Civil War Matters" for its July 3 edition commemorating the 150th Anniversary of Pickett's Charge. Pickett's Charge occurred on the third day of the Battle of Gettysburg on July 3, 1863.

'Herald' publisher among Carter House's new board members — Williamson Herald — 6/27/13 — FRANKLIN — The Carter House recently announced the addition of four new Board of Director members – Mike Bailey, John Bibb, Derby Jones and Monty McInturff. "We're proud to have the addition of these distinguished community leaders serving on our board," said Ed Underwood, Carter House president. "The Carter House is gearing up for the 150th Sesquicentennial of the Battle of Franklin and they will assist in the effort to enhance the experience for visitors to Franklin. Mike, John, Derby and Monty all bring a wealth of knowledge and passion to our board as we work to implement our strategic plan." Word of emancipation remembered at Juneteenth

event — Williamson Herald— 6/17/13 — FRANKLIN — The national Juneteenth celebration marks when the word spread to Galveston, Texas, that slaves were set free at the conclusion of the Civil War. According to Thomas Murdic, General Gordon Granger, of Franklin renown, notified the slaves in Galveston of the Emancipation. This was followed by much celebration. The event was celebrated in Franklin June 15 at McLemore House.
