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Lovell Property Purchase Update

Julian Bibb at Franklins Charge reports encouraging news concerning the purchase deal on the Lovell properties. These two houses are immediately south of the Carter House and now stand on the Carter garden where desperate trench fighting continued in the darkness after the Confederate charge into the Federal line.

The purchase is a joint effort of the City, the National Parks Service, the Civil War Trust and Franklins Charge, a non-profit entity formed by all of the local and state preservation groups. The original closing date was May 27, but the buyer and seller have agreed to delay that date until the NPS American Battlefield Protection Program Grant is received. The City of Franklin is the pass-through agent for the grant, and has budgeted its portion of the funding in its July 1 budget.

The City has been notified by letter that its proposed ABPP Land Acquisition Grant has been selected for funding in the current year. No revised closing date has been set but it should occur in July or August, Bibb estimates. The two houses will be removed and the Lovell parcel then transferred to the City along with other adjoining parcels purchased by the Civil War Trust and local preservation groups over the last 18 years. The aggregated 20 acres will be known as the Carter Hill Battlefield Park and will be improved by the Franklins City Parks Department.

Heritage Foundation Makes Community Enhancement Award to Cannons On The Square Committee

It was SRO at Franklin Theater on May 19 for the Heritage Foundation Annual Preservation Awards. This event publicly recognizes the homeowners, businesses and organizations that make significant

contributions to preserving, restoring and improving Franklin's historic appearance. It is always a packed house with much joyous celebration as the slides show the before & after changes.

In 2014, the Franklin Battlefield Preservation Commission formed the Cannons On The Square Committee to acquire reproduction carriages for the four 6-pounders displayed on the Public Square. The Committee asked STFB to act as agent to raise public funds, to apply for City and State grants and to buy the carriages. The Franklin Streets Dept prepared the site and installed the carriages. The new carriages completely change the appearance of the Square and the audience actually cheered when the 'after' pictures were shown.

Eagle Scout Donates New Gate at Lorings Advance Access

Eagle Scout Candidate William Rutledge, with the help of his Scout advisor, friends and family, has completed the Lorings Advance access gate as his Eagle Scout project. Several months ago, after learning of the need for a Lorings Advance access gate, Rutledge presented STFB with a plan for a swing-gate in the maintenance entrance from Meadowlawn Drive to the 5-acre Lorings Advance parcel, owned by the Civil War Trust.

Following the preliminary acceptance by STFB and after consulting with officials at Franklin City Parks for gate specifications, he presented the plan to the B.S.A. Eagle Scout Committee. Following the B.S.A. approval, Rutledge began the task of acquiring materials, having the timbers cut, the hardware fabricated, and lining up the necessary construction equipment for installation. The project was completed at the end of May.

Preservation Volunteers Open A Second Front at Winstead Hill

Another important preservation campaign is underway in Franklin. City Arborist Todd Snackenburg recently teamed with volunteers from the Tennessee Chapter of the American Chestnut Foundation (www.acf.org) to reintroduce American chestnut trees at Winstead Hill Park. The Tennessee Chapter worked with Todd, the Franklin Tree Commission, and the Franklin Parks Department to establish a demonstration planting of seven Restoration Chestnuts in the park on April 7, 2015.

At the time of the Civil War, the American chestnut was a dominant tree in the original Appalachian forests and common on Civil War Battlefields, including middle Tennessee. It was a major food source for wildlife and for the settlers themselves. In 1904, an imported blight struck the species, and by 1950 nearly all mature American chestnut trees were killed.

The American Chestnut Foundation was formed in 1983, and after 30 years of selective 'backcrossing' with the blight-resistant Chinese chestnut, the trees planted here are 15/16 American chestnut, and are predicted to be highly blight resistant. The City of Franklin plans to erect descriptive signage at the Winstead Hill grove.

The Tennessee Chapter of ACF also planted a large grove of Restoration Chestnuts last fall at the Oppenheimer Orchard out west of Franklin. Large-scale plantings of the Restoration Chestnut will continue and will be a huge step toward restoring one more important native tree to America's Battlefields.

Base of Franklin Cotton Gin Found — The Tennessean — 5/24/15 — FRANKLIN —

Following efforts in 2009 and, again, earlier this year, in mid-May, a crew with the engineering firm TRC located the foundation of the Carter Cotton Gin. It was "good, Middle Tennessee limestone," as Larry McKee, the lead archeologist stated. The archaeological work is part of a broad effort to reclaim battlefield land for what will ultimately become a 20-acre park next to the Carter House.
