Seeing the handwritten note on the wall at the Lodge from a 14th Michigan Infantry soldier was especially poignant for these Michiganders.



History of the Civil War Trust Just Released

In commemoration of the 30th anniversary of the Civil War Trust, a new book explores the rise of the organization, from humble beginnings to become the national champion for historic battlefield preservation.




Fighting the Second Civil War: A History of Battlefield Preservation and the Emergence of the Civil War Trust, by historian Bob Zeller, tells the story of the Civil War Trust's extraordinary journey to become the most successful nonprofit battlefield preservation organization in American history.

Starting with the 1987 founding of the Association for the Preservation of Civil War Sites, the book highlights numerous preservation dramas both successful and not that ultimately led to the protection of more than 46,000 acres at 132 Civil War, Revolutionary War and War of 1812 battlefields throughout the nation. These include the high-profile struggle with a Disney theme park at Manassas, the unlikely restoration of the Franklin Battlefield, two national crusades against casino gambling at Gettysburg, and the 11th-hour campaign to save the famous George Washington's charge site at Princeton.

The Lotz House has released the <u>third edition</u> of its book: *The Lotz Family, Survivors of the Battle of Franklin*. The book, co-authored by J.T. Thompson

and Robert Z. Carlisle II, tells the story of the Lotz Family and their experiences with success, tragedy, heartbreak and war.

"Since our last issue, we have unearthed more information, photos and stories about the Lotz family through artifacts found in and around the home and cellar and our incredible visitors who come from all over the country," said Lotz House Executive Director, J.T. Thompson. "Robert Carlisle's hard work and dedication to carrying on the Lotz family's history is outstanding and something to be celebrated."

Some of the additions to the updated version include: 21 new photographs, a complete listing of Matilda Lotz's new paintings and her paintings accepted by the Paris Salon between 1882 and 1886, a chapter on the life of Capt. Thomas Jefferson Carothers and additional information on Williamson County pioneer Robert G. Buchanan.

The foreword, written by Civil War historian Thomas Y. Cartwright, describes the book as, "an opportunity to learn about a creative and resilient family that withstood the trials and tribulations of life to leave a legacy that will stand the test of time."
