Cannons Arrive for Carter Hill Battlefield Park

20 when Historical Ordnance Works delivered three cannons to Carter Hill Battlefield Park. The replica 3" ordnance rifles will be placed on the trench line just east of Columbia Pike. These guns will depict the 1st Kentucky Battery that was overrun by the Confederate breakthrough but later recaptured by Federal troops. An on-order replica Napoleon 12-pounder will be delivered in October and placed near the cotton gin. A dedication ceremony will be held Nov 10 at 1:00 AM.

Franklin's Charge President Cullen Smith is also Chair of the Cannons on the Battlefield Committee that raised the funds to buy the three guns. "We want to add the fourth cannon to accurately portray the Kentucky battery," Smith said, "but so far we only have money for three." The fourth ordnance rifle and carriage will cost about \$18,000.

Mary Pearce Honored by the Tennessee Civil War Preservation Association

The TCWPA is a state-wide group of preservation advocates dedicated to promoting the preservation of battlefield lands across the state. They focus special attention on smaller and less known battlefields. The group also sponsored and receives income form the Civil War License Plate – see <u>http://www.tcwpa.org</u>

For special occasions, TCWPA presents the Presidents Preservation Award to someone for exceptional preservation efforts. This year's award went to Mary Pearce, who recently retired as the Executive Director of the Heritage Foundation of Franklin and Williamson County after three decades of service.

The Tennessee Preservation Trust held their Annual Conference in Franklin Sept 20-22. Knowing Mary would be there, TCWPA officers asked for a few minutes during the pre-conference reception to present the award to her. The plaque reads in part 'For Outstanding Contributions to the Preservation of Civil War Battlefields in Tennessee'.

Mary is a founding Board Member of STFB (1989) and has been involved in every battlefield preservation project in Franklin. She also was a prime mover in the new streetscape for Main Street and the Public Square, the birthing of the many Franklin Street Festivals, the rescue and restoration of Franklin Theater (it's worth a trip to Franklin to see) and the restoration of the 1940 Williamson County Jail, now the Heritage Foundation offices. Many of her friends were at the Reception and were greatly pleased to see her receive this recognition.

United Kingdom CWRT Returns to Franklin for Update on Preservation Successes

Yes, there is a CWRT in the United Kingdom. It was started in 1953 and a group of them has visited Franklin several times, usually every 3-4 years. Their intrepid leader, Peter Lockwood, has been an STFB member since 2002 and has a strong interest in the many preservation projects here in Franklin. The group publishes a tri-annual *Crossfire* glossy magazine for their membership. The summer 2017 issue has a four-page article on Col Emerson Opdycke and the 125th OVI. The UKCWRT has closely followed Franklin's progress via the STFB newsletter which they share with their membership. Since their last visit, Dominos and the strip mall were removed, the Lovell buildings were removed, an access was added to Lorings Advance, and the cotton gin and trench lines have been located. Their last visit didn't allow time for Ft Granger, so the new entrance and signage there were of great interest.

News in Review September 2017

Breaking records, Williamson hits all-time high in tourism spending — Williamson-The Tennessean — 8/27/17 — Franklin — Another record number year for Williamson County as its tourism impact grew 9.4 percent in 2016. The economic impact of traveler spending grew by \$17 million over 2015 to a new alltime high of \$427.25 million. Travelers are bringing in over \$8.95 million in local tax revenues and creating over 3,500 jobs, which is great news for every Williamson County resident.

Franklin divided on keeping Confederate statue in downtown — Williamson-The Tennessean — 8/30/17 — Franklin — With thousands of signatures, two different petitions have taken center stage in Franklin—showing a division of what to do with a longstanding Confederate statue. The Daughters of the Confederacy placed the Confederate soldier statue on the square to remember those who died in the Battle of Franklin. The petition "Save Chip," started three days ago, is nearing 2,600 signers.

Battle of Franklin Trust to give slavery tours at Carter House, Carnton — Williamson Herald — 9/1/17 — FRANKLIN — The tour will focus on slavery as an institution and specific individuals who were enslaved at each site. "I am excited to delve into the perspective of the enslaved individuals who lived on farms such as Carter House and Carnton," said Kristi Farrow, a genealogist with the Battle of Franklin Trust who will lead the tours.
