Carter House Visitor Center Update

At its last meeting, the Franklin Battlefield Preservation Commission heard a short briefing on the plans for the new Carter House Visitor Center. The design is not finalized, but the general plan is for the Center to be located on the left side of the current entrance to the Carter House parking lot and built into the sloping bank there.

The new Center will be the first phase of the overall plan for the Carter House grounds. Construction drawings are planned to be available in August sometime but the current thinking is for a two-story 9,600 sqft building with natural wood siding and a metal roof. The idea is for the Visitor Center to appear as an outbuilding or barn on the Carter farm.

The entrance is on the northwest side at ground level with the parking lot. The second floor will open to the southeast at the general level of the Carter House grounds. An open-air plaza at this

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level will provide space for gatherings and events.

Some time after the new center opens, the current visitor center will be removed. It is built on a fill area on the actual trench line that eventually will be returned to its original terrain profile.

For you who are familiar with the current visitor center, the new center will provide adequate meeting rooms, offices and (most of all) restrooms. When pictures are available, we will do another update.

Lotz House receives eighth consecutive Trip Advisor Certificate of Excellence

The historic Lotz House, located in downtown Franklin, has received a 2017 TripAdvisor Certificate of Excellence for the eighth year in a row.

The Certificate of Excellence is awarded to attractions with consistently high visitor ratings, and the Lotz House has maintained a five-star rating on the site since opening to the public in 2008. These impressive ratings rank Lotz House as the number one attraction in Franklin, among a community with many wonderful historical attractions.

The Lotz House has been on the National Historic Register since 1976 and is located in the heart of historic downtown Franklin at ground zero of the pivotal Civil War battle, the Battle of Franklin.

The house is open Monday–Saturday from 9 a.m.–5 p.m. and Sunday from 1–4 p.m. or by appointment. The Lotz House is located at 1111 Columbia Avenue and offers Battlefield Walking Tours, Cellar Tours and tours of the McGavock Confederate Cemetery. Witnessing the Transformation at the Historic Franklin Masonic Hall By Rachael Finch

Designated a National Historic Landmark in 1973, the Historic Franklin Masonic Hall is a multi-year, multimillion-dollar rehabilitation project, offering visitors a behind the scenes experience into the lives of all people forever connected by the political, social, and economic transformation of Franklin, Tennessee, and the United States.

The Hall, (c1823) a rare example of early Gothic architecture in Tennessee, served as the negotiation location for the Treaty of Franklin (1830) between President Andrew Jackson, Secretary of War John Eaton, Cabinet member General John Coffee, and representative Chickasaw Chiefs. Originally serving a dual purpose; a first floor public space and Masonic spaces on its second and third floors, the onset of the Civil War transformed the Hall during the four, long, hard years of war.

Recently, transformative preservation work has revealed names of Civil War soldiers in never before seen areas of the Hall! As our team continues to carefully survey and examine hidden recesses of the Hall, we engage with its uniquely significant Civil War past. With the first phase of work scheduled for late summer 2018, continued conservation of interior spaces, and educational hands-on preservation workshops are slated to begin by late fall.

The Historic Franklin Masonic Hall is the location of the oldest continuously occupying fraternity, Hiram Lodge 7, in the state of Tennessee and endures as one of the oldest Masonic Halls in the United States. The Historic Franklin Masonic Hall Foundation (HFMHF) is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization established to preserve, conserve, and interpret the nearly two hundred year history of the Franklin Masonic Hall.

News In Review June 2018

'Telling the whole story:' Franklin woman uncovers slaves turned soldiers — Williamson-The Tennessean — 5/27/18 — Franklin — As a result of Tina Jones' research into the U.S. Colored Troops — segregated regiments of the U.S. Union Army that fought during the Civil War—she has identified around 300 soldiers. She started with just eight soldiers who had served in the regiments. Ahead of the Memorial Day weekend, Jones put the finishing touches on a new exhibit inside the Williamson County Archives in downtown Franklin.

Memorial Day Ceremony at Five Points to focus on African-American soldiers — Williamson Herald — 5/25/18 — Franklin — This year the ceremony recognized Williamson County African-American soldiers who served during the Civil War with the US Colored Troops, segregated units of the US Army, and in the US Navy. It was formerly thought only a handful of former slaves from Williamson County served during the Civil War; however, African American Heritage Society member Tina Jones has recently uncovered research estimating the numbers were about 300. Twenty-nine of these USCT soldiers have been recognized through engraved brick pavers in the Williamson County Veterans' Park.

Heritage Foundation symposium features preservation success stories — Williamson Herald — 6/4/18 — Franklin — The day-long, New Preservation Directions symposium featured internationally known speakers, Robert Leath, Chris Ohrstrom and Matthew Webster, as they discussed historic preservation projects they had been a part of. The symposium was hosted by the Heritage Foundation of Williamson County and Renasant Bank.

Lotz House, Living History Corp announce second annual 'living history' event — Williamson Herald — 6/5/18 — Franklin — The June 16 live event focused on the Tennessee Campaign of 1864 and the Army of the Cumberland, one of the principal Union armies during the Civil War. Historians from the Living History Corp portrayed and reenacted various branches of service including infantry, medical staff and the United States Colored Troops. There was also a special appearance from President Abraham Lincoln and a display of Civil War relics for guests to observe.

Franklin author's new book deeply explores Tennessee's slave history — Williamson Herald — 6/6/18 — Franklin — In his new book, "Runaways, Coffles and Fancy Girls: A History of Slavery in Tennessee," Franklin author and historian Bill Carey includes a 56-page appendix of various runaway slave ads found in old newspapers from across the state. Each item consists of the slave's name and age; the newspaper's name where the ad appeared and the publication date; the slave holder's name and the county in which the slave was held; and, most compellingly, a special note about the slave that could help lead to his or her capture.

African American Heritage Society to host Juneteenth at McLemore House — Williamson Herald — 6/14/18 — Franklin — On June 16, the African American Heritage Society hosted its 13th annual Juneteenth celebration at the McLemore House located at 446 11th Ave. in Franklin from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. The event was free and the public was invited to join the celebration, festivities and food. American Legion Post 215 performed the opening ceremony in which both the American and the Juneteenth flags were raised. Activities throughout the day included plenty of music, recognition of Pioneer and Freedom families presented at the annual Black Tie events, storytelling, Bingo and games for children. Hourly door prizes were awarded.
