### Sunday, November 10th -- two screenings of Emmy award winning film to benefit Franklin battlefield

Franklin, Tenn. – A second showing of the Emmy Award winning film, "The Battle of Franklin", was just announced for Sunday, November 10th. The first show at 5 pm is nearly sold-out. The second screening will start at 8pm. The program will include a discussion on the battle, the film, and preservation efforts, followed by the showing of the 74-minute documentary on the battle.

The film's director and producer Robert Lee Hodge, of East Nashville, said that it is only the sixth time the film has been shown in Franklin on the big screen. After selling-out the beautiful theatre the last five years Hodge is repeating the effort on Sunday, November 10th. He said, "It is always great to share this Emmy Award winning project with an audience from Franklin. Much of the footage was shot there – at Carnton, The Carter House, and the cemeteries. Making the film was a dream come true." The annual showing of Hodge's documentary has generated upwards of \$8,000 for Franklin battlefield preservation.

A Booklist review stated that Hodge's film is, "... an exceptional program for both students and Civil War buffs ... worthy to be alongside filmmaker Ken Burns' acclaimed The Civil War."

Robert Hicks, author of Widow of the South, said, "The film very much captures the emotion that I would

envision was felt at the Battle of Franklin."

Tickets for the second showing just went on sale and are \$20.00 and can be purchased through the Franklin Theatre website: <u>http://www.franklintheatre.com</u> or call 615-538-2076. One-third of the ticket's sales will go toward preservation efforts at the Franklin battlefield.

Historian, Eric Jacobson said of the documentary, "It is a timeless representation of this important event in our history, and never fails to evoke a multitude of emotions. From the musical score, to the re-enactment footage, to the careful way in which accounts of the battle are interwoven, the film never lags. The opening scenes are exceptionally powerful and the conclusion is near perfection."

Chief Historian Emeritus of the National Park Service, Ed Bearss, said, ". . . one of the best, if not the best, documentaries I have seen on a Civil War battle. Not since Ken Burns' monumental PBS production, *The Civil War*, have I seen better."

### Five New Markers Dedicated October 17 On Franklin Square

A crowd estimated in excess of 200 gathered at the old Courthouse on Franklin Square on a bright and crisp October morning to see the Dedication Ceremony for

new markers placed on the Square. The markers are intended to tell the "Fuller Story" of Franklin's Civil War era. Expanding the historical breadth of Franklin's story was the brainchild of three local pastors Hewitt Sawyers, Dr. Chris Williamson and Dr. Kevin Riggs, and historian Eric Jacobson. During the last two years, they had many discussions among themselves, their congregations, the African American community, and the greater middle Tennessee history professionals.

The new markers tell the stories of the African American experience before, during and after the Civil War. The old courthouse was completed and put into service in 1858. During the Union occupation, the U.S. Provost Marshall Headquarters, where United States Colored Troops were enrolled, was housed in the Courthouse. One marker tells the USCT story and a life-size bronze statue of a USCT soldier will be added later near the courthouse. Eric Jacobson announced a fundraising campaign for the statue sponsored by the Battle of Franklin Trust. When campaign details are published, we will pass them along. The two other courthouse markers explain the Riot of 1867 and the Reconstruction era.

The original plan to add two markers on the roundabout at a later date was altered to install all five markers at the same time. One roundabout marker will present an Overview of the Battle of Franklin and the other will describe the Market House where Enslaved People were bought and sold.

In a separate but complementary project, the Battle of Franklin Trust has recently installed historical markers at Carnton near the enslaved dwelling and the enslaved cemetery. These new signs provide visitors a better understanding of the site itself as well as the dozens of people who lived and worked there long before the Civil War.



The two markers on the island are installed on the streetlevel sidewalk near the steps onto the upper level. Visitors will face the Monument as they view the markers.

The Battle of Franklin Trust plans additional interpretative signage at Carnton and the Carter House that will add greater context to the story of all of the people living there over the years.

### News in Review October 2019

Sons of Confederate Veterans now claim ownership of memorials removed in Franklin — Williamson–The Tennessean — 9/26/19 — Franklin — In an Aug. 13 complaint filed to the Tennessee Historical Commission, the Sons of Confederate Veterans argued that the City of Franklin violated the Tennessee Heritage Protection Act. Franklin staff removed the stakes on Columbia Avenue in the spring after the Civil War Commission concluded there was a lack of historical context and that they created confusion for visitors.

Stories of enslaved people now shared at Carnton in Franklin — Williamson–The Tennessean — 10/9/19 — Franklin — The Battle of Franklin Trust has installed two new interpretive signs at Carnton which will feature some of the site's stories of enslaved people. The new signs are, "The Springhouse" and "Beyond the House." They will discuss Randal McGavock's spring house and Carnton's farm land and the history it contains.
