

Retreat from Pulaski to Nashville, Tenn., Scofield, Captain Levi T., Cleveland, Press of the Caxton Co, 1909, 67 pps.

With the passing of each November 30, fewer and fewer veterans of the battle of Franklin were among the living to relate the horrors, heroism, and circumstances of those five tragic hours. To mark the passage of forty-five such November 30ths, a Union veteran officer decided to publish his account of the events that followed Gen. Hood's advance into Tennessee during the late autumn of 1864.

Captain Levi Scofield, an engineer officer serving with the Union Army's 23rd Corps, relates in his book The Retreat from Pulaski to Nashville, Tenn. the events that brought him into "hell...let loose." Throughout the book the author recounts his experiences on the march as well as in the battles. Information concerning different areas of the battlefield, as related by other veterans of the battles of Franklin and Nashville, are used to produce a comprehensive account of the placement of troops and the actions reported from their fronts.

Combining this narrative with many original photographs, maps, and line drawings, the author gives The Retreat from Pulaski to Nashville, Tenn. an ease of understanding this often confusing campaign. The author chose sixty-nine photographs to be published within this work. Many images are of commanding officers, but more importantly, several show the ground over which the battle of Franklin was fought. These photographs were taken approximately twenty years after the cessation of hostilities and before the southern side of Franklin was developed. They are particularly useful for researches and historians who want a better perspective of the original battlefield. Also, the author added original line drawings of battle scenes and acts of heroism exhibited by Union and Confederate soldiers. The maps included within this work are clear and concise and give a fairly accurate interpretation of the battle-lines discussed throughout the publication.

Capt. Scofield's work has long been a rare and much sought after resource by researchers and historians. As interest in the American Civil War continues to grow daily on a national level, this work is one that is not only significant as a local history, but one that can potentially demand the attention of interested parties across the United States. Researchers, historians, collectors, buffs, and even tourists will find a reprint of this work intriguing enough to want a copy for their own library.

#### IMPORTANT BOOK OFFERING

Save The Franklin Battlefield is sponsoring the re-publication of <u>Retreat From Pulaski To Nashville</u> by Captain Levi T. Scofield (see book review on page 1). Originally printed in limited quantities in 1909, this Union Engineer's excellent eyewitness account of Hood's 1864 Tennessee Campaign, with emphasis on Franklin, is virtually unknown to all but the most ardent of Civil War buffs.

Wiley Sword has written a new *forward* to the book for STFB. Mr. Sword is author of *Embrace An Angry Wind*, considered by many to be the best recently written book on the Middle Tennessee Campaign of 1864. The reprint is indexed, and the first 1,000 copies are a numbered limited edition.
