Attention Treasure Hunters by Sam Huffman

No matter which of the great states you call home, you just may be overlooking one of the great education opportunities that is available in your neighborhood. If you have always wanted to learn more about our Civil War history but never knew just who to call or where to start, you can quickly get set on the right path when you join and regularly attend the meetings of a Civil War Round Table.

Each CWRT usually meets monthly to discuss and study all aspects of the Civil War era - military, civilian, economics, political, social and more. Each group sets its own programs but they usually include guest lecturers, authors, historians - with time set aside for discussions and Q&A. Topics also include how and where to do source document research, book reviews, updates on research projects, and newly discovered information and artifacts.

Civil War discussion groups supposedly first adopted the CWRT designation in the late 1940's. By the CW Centennial years in the early 1960's, the Round Table moniker was widely used as the popularity of CW study gained public interest. Today, there are an estimated 200-300 CWRTs in the USA with others in the U.K., Australia and Canada.

Now that you understand the treasure of CW knowledge mined by these dedicated groups, here's a list of the three CWRTs in Middle Tennessee. It's perfectly OK to join more than one. They will be glad to have you participate. And you will meet some just pretty nice people.

Battle of Nashville Monument Rededication - James Summerville

The Battle of Nashville Monument will be rededicated on Sat., June 26, 1999. Time and particulars of the program will be announced later by the Tennessee Historical Commission.

The statue is currently undergoing restoration at Granny White Pike at Battlefield Drive. The new granite base, the restored bronze statue, and the stone obelisk are now in place. Sculptor Coley Coleman expects to complete the capstone, the Angel of Peace, in mid-March. It will then be set atop the obelisk, adding 15 feet to the structure. One of the tasks remaining include the reinscription of the base.

Subcontractor McPherson and Shaw is finishing the Wall of Peace on the southeast quadrant of the site. It serves as a retaining wall for the plaza that is part of the concept plan for the park. The wall has been made possible by a gift from the Frist Foundation.

A campaign is beginning for the remainder of the funds to build the park, designed by Hawkins Partners.

A time capsule was placed within the base of the monument on Mon., Nov. 23. It holds photographs from the original 1927 dedication; a brief history of the sculpture and related efforts to memorialize the Civil War; letters from writer John Egerton and the official Metro-Davidson County Historian John Connelly; and numerous other documents.

Forgotten General Story Continues by E. J. Neeley

Last month I closed my article on General Gordon with him serving in Congress.

He died on August 9, 1911, his funeral cortege was a weeping Memphis city on August 12, 1911. Traffic seemed to voluntarily come to a stop as the funeral procession moved from Confederate Hall to the Second Presbyterian Church and the message delivered to a crowd of hundreds packed into the church.

It was reported he planned his own funeral requesting to be buried in his

It was reported he planned his own funeral requesting to be buried in his gray uniform and his comrades performing the burial service. He believed throughout his life in the righteousness of the cause of the South and he desired that his burial how he died with the same opinion.

The floral tribute was imposing, arriving from all parts of the country. He was buried in Elmwood Cemetery.

It was said Gordon never neglected any duty. Senator Robert L. Taylor of Tennessee spoke, "He never knew fear, either in battle or in peace. He never knew how to be false to his principles or to his people. His death is a calamity to his State and to the South, but we can not bring him back to life again, for he has crossed over the river to rest with Stonewall Jackson under the shades of the trees." Taylor had "loved him for his courage, for his honor, and for his loyalty to his people."

He concluded with his wish for "Peace to his ashes."



The calendar will make a splendid gift, not only for those who are Civil War enthusiasts, but as a beautiful commemorative calendar for every home in Williamson County.


Commemorative

Day by Day Text

The daily entries for each month chronicle the events in Williamson and surrounding counties during the War years. From the spring of 1863 onward, there were noteworthy engagements at Brentwood, Thompson's Station, Triune, Spring Hill, and several times at Franklin. There also were skirmishes at Arrington, Nolensville, and Hillsboro and numerous incidents in the countryside throughout the county. The back inside cover has a Middle Tennessee map with the place names of the day by day events.
