Dell Computer Won't Build At Stones River Battlefield - The Civil War News - June 1999 - Preservation groups and the National Park Service breathed a sigh of relief when it was announced on May 6 that Dell Computer decided against building a new plant on a 500 acre site that comprises a portion of the Stones River battlefield.

Dell's decision was only "step one" in a campaign to save the land. "Now we need to try to take the opportunity to see if there's a way to provide for its long-term protection," said Don Barger, Southeast Regional Director of the National Parks & Conservation Association (NCPA). "It's obvious that the City of Murfreesboro would like to see this area developed. We think that would be tragic." The NCPA, the Civil War Trust, Civil War Roundtable Associates, and the Tennessee Nature Conservancy joined forces to inform Dell of the property's historic significance. Dell Corporation has chosen a site in Nashville instead.

Step Two is attempting to talk Dell into helping purchase the Stones River property, or at the very least handing over their option on the land according to Barger. He wanted to get into substative discussions with Dell before the option lapses and to see if Dell is willing to work with preservation groups to save that part of the site.

Mary Ann Peckham, Stones River Superintendent said "I'm certainly concerned that while Dell has chosen another option, the pressure to develop this site is immense." The park wants to add nearly 600 acres, doubling its present size in order to preserve key sites from development.

Barger said inclusion of the land in the battlefield park would greatly enhance the public ability to understand. "We believe that for Murfreesboro, protecting this site for its historic significance would be a long-term economic benefit for the community. There's a lot of places where you can put an assembly plant. Battlefield are where they are."

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local Civil War sites that their 1998 itinerary would not permit.



Stones River National Battlefield Summer Schedule

The schedule of summer events to be held at Stones River National Battlefield is now available at the visitor center. Living history presentations of Civil War artillery, infantry and cavalry are among the programs that will be offered this summer. In addition, visiting speakers will also

present programs on certain summer weekends, and candlelight tours of the National Cemetery will also be offered.

July 24-Motlow State Community College History Professor, Dr. Michael Bradley, will speak on "Tullahoma: The Forgotten Campaign of 1863."

August 7, 8, 14, and 15-Middle Tennessee State University History Professor, Dr. Bob Hunt, will give talks on "Southern Possibilities of Victory"

September 18 and 19-Middle Tennessee State Geography and Geology Professor, Doug Heffington, will speak on the importance of Archeology and the Civil war at 2:00 p.m.

On weekdays, from **June 1 through August 29**, National Park Service rangers will lead walks and present talks that will originate at the visitor center at 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.

Stories taken from the letters and diaries of men who fought and died in the Civil Ware are presented in a tour of the Stones River National Cemetery. Park employees and volunteers play the roles of soldiers and civilians whose lives were changed by the war. The "Hallowed Ground: A Tour of the National Cemetery" program will be offered seven times this summer. The first tour will be held on Saturday, June 5, 1999 at 7:30 p.m. There is no fee for the program but reservations are required. Comfortable walking shoes and insect repellent are recommended. Cemetery tours will also be offered on June 19, July 3 and 24, August 7 and 28, and September 4, 1999. Reservations for each of the programs can be made by calling or signing up at the visitor center no sooner that 8:30 a.m. the Monday prior to the program.

July 10 and 11-The roar of a Union Artillery battery can be heard rumbling across the land, as the Battlefield presents its annual living history encampment. The demonstrations for Saturday will be performed at 11:00 a.m., 12:00 noon, 1, 2, 3, and 4:00 p.m. Sunday demonstrations will be held at 11:00 a.m., 12 noon, 1, 2 and 3:00 p.m.

August 14 and 15-The thunder of horses will be heard when the 7th Tennessee Cavalry, CSA presents demonstrations at 11:00 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. on Saturday and at 12:00 noon and 2:30 p.m. on Sunday.

July 17 and 18-The 19th United States Regular Army Infantry will present infantry demonstrations.

August 21 and 22 -The 1st Tennessee Infantry, CSA will present programs on Infantry demonstrations at 11:00 a.m., 1, 2 and 3:00 p.m.

Stones River National Battlefield is located on the Old Nashville Highway, northwest of Murfreesboro. Additional information is available at the visitor center or by calling (615) 893-9501 (TDD).
