November 30 marks the 135th anniversary of the Battle of Franklin. Commemorating this poignant occasion, Franklin's Civil War sites in conjunction with area Civil War preservationists and historians have coordinated a weekend-long memorial.

The weekend begins with the Candlelight tour of the McGavock Confederate Cemetery. Tours begin at 5:00 and run until 8:00. Tickets are to be purchased at the gate. The cost is \$5/adults, \$2/children 12 and under.

STFB invites you to help staff the Saturday calendar booths at local groceries this fall.



Some of the Messages Sent, Received, and Answered November 30, 1864 by E. J. Neeley

I quote here from a telegram sent to Major General Thomas, Nashville, Franklin, November 30, 1864.

"Your dispatch of 10:25 am is received. I am satisfied that I have heretofore run much risk in trying to hold Hood in check, while so far inferior to him in both infantry and cavalry. The slightest mistake on my part, or failure of a subordinate, during the last three days, might have proved disastrous. I don't want to get into so tight a place again. Yet I will cheerfully act in accordance with your views of expediency, if you think it important to hold Hood back as long as possible. When you get all your troops together, and the cavalry in effective condition, we can whip Hood easily, and I believe, make the campaign a decisive one. Before that, the most we can do is to husband our strength and increase it as much as possible. I fear the troops which were stationed on the river below Columbia will be lost. I will get my trains out of the way as soon as possible, and watch Hood carefully. Possibly I may be able to hold him here, but do not expect to be able to do so long."

Saturday, November 27—The Carter House, Historic Carnton, Plantation, and the Lotz House—will host a special guided tour of the battlefield. Trolley buses donated by the City of Franklin will leave approximately every half hour from Winstead Hill and take visitors on a 45 minute tour. Guided tours run from 8 am-5 pm. After the tour, visitors can visit all the Civil War Sites around town where military reenactors will be stationed. Admission for the bus tour, and admission to all three houses will be packaged priced at \$20/adults and seniors, \$10/ children, and \$17 for groups of six or more. Also included in this package, will be a limited edition commemorative ribbon, which also served as the ticket, and an annotated map of the battle. The map may be purchased separately for \$7. Tickets for this special event may be purchased beginning

In Thomas telegram back to Schofield, he informs him that General Smith troops, at least one division, is "still behind." Thomas states, "We must therefore try to hold Hood where he now is . . Do you think you can hold Hood at Franklin for three days longer?"

Schofield's replay from Franklin 3pm November 30, 1864.

"I do not believe I can. I can doubtless hold him one day, but will hazard something in doing that . . . I have no doubt Forrest will be in my rear tomorrow, or doing some greater mischief. It appears to me that I ought to take position at Brentwood at once .

After receiving this telegram Thomas tells Schofield "... Hold your troops in readiness to march to Brentwood." Schofield's answer again to Thomas "General - Please send A. J. Smith's division to Brentwood early tomorrow morning. Also please send to Brentwood tomorrow morning one million rounds of infantry ammunition, 2,000 rounds three inch and 1,000 rounds light twelve artillery."

November 1 at the Carter House, Lotz House, or Carnton.

On Sunday, November 28, there will be a sunrise memorial service in the McGavock Confederate Cemetery. At 1:30pm, Franklin's SCV will conclude the weekend by marching from Winstead Hill to a rededication ceremony of the Confederate Monument on the square. This year marks the 100th anniversary of the monument.
