STFB V... MAIL



For those old enough to remember WW II, V..._ MAIL (V for Victory) was a way everyone could help the war effort by reducing the weight and bulk of postal mail going to troops overseas. Written on a specific VMAIL form, the letter was microfilmed before shipment and then photoprinted at its destination before it was delivered to its intended recipient.

STFB VMAIL is a bit different, but it is a way for all STFB members to help local preservation efforts by working as a STFB VOLUNTEER. Anytime a STFB event requires a lending hand, we will VMAIL all our members so they will be aware of the need. The needed help might be for newsletter folding and stuffing, staffing a calendar booth at Kroger, or being a "ghost" re-enactor at our annual cemetery tour.

The VMAILs will even go to our out-of-town members because, believe it or not, some of them plan their visits to Franklin so they can be a part of the STFB events.

Volunteers Needed at Ropers Knob

And speaking of volunteers..._ the north-east corner of the 1863 Federal encampment and fortifications just north of Franklin was built on Ropers Knob, the highest hill rising from the Franklin basin floor. A large Federal blockhouse with heavy artillery plus a signal tower were constructed atop these commanding heights.

A few years ago, the State of Tennessee purchased the top of Ropers Knob and the Heritage Foundation bought much of the flanking acreage with the intent to one day have a passive park there. Volunteer Jim Mahurin is coordinating the park project for the Heritage Foundation. Surveyors have designed an "easy slope" trail beginning at the end of Reveille Court that goes all the way to the top of Ropers Knob. Now it is just a matter of finding the volunteers to make this vision become reality.

The planned pathway starts toward the saddle just west of Ropers Knob, turns east rising steadily along the south face of the hill, then curls left around the east and north faces as it rises gently to the summit. Part of the trail has been completed, but Jim needs more volunteers to clear debris from the two-foot wide pathway and to cut back foliage overhang.

An adopted section of the trail would be an excellent Satur-

LOBBY COPY STFB 2000 Calendars

For this year's 2000 calendar campaign, we are trying a new marketing approach that, so far, is working very well. We have donated a STFB 2000 calendar to several businesses in middle Tennessee that have a public waiting area where visitors can see the STFB 2000 calendar.

The calendar is simply left with all the magazines and other reading in the waiting area. A sticker on the front cover identifies it as a 'LOBBY COPY' and instructs the reader to see the mail ordering information on the back cover of the calendar. We placed 10 - 15 copies last week and are already receiving mail orders.

Annual Membership Meeting November 14, 999

The annual membership meeting took place at Historic Franklin Presbyterian Church. The Teenie Pinkerton Dozier award was presented to Fred Prouty, Military Sites Preservation Specialist for the Tennessee Historical Commission. After receipt of his award, Mr. Prouty briefly discussed the status of Civil War site preservation in Tennessee today. He shared with us some current plans and proposals for preservation.

Mr. Thomas Cartwright did a fantastic job in his keynote address. He briefly discussed the importance of battlefield preservation because one must walk the grounds of the battlefield to gain a sense of the battle itself. He discussed some individual participants in the Battle of Franklin, both Confederate and Union. He concluded his discussion by crediting many people who have contributed to the knowledge of the Battle of Franklin and to the parts of the battlefield that have been preserved and will be preserved in the future.

Day-by-Day Civil War Calendar for the year 2000 now available

For the second time in as many years, the Save The Franklin Battlefield organization in Franklin has published 'The Civil War in Williamson County and Middle Tennessee Calendar' as a major public education and fund-raising project. The calendar has hundreds of daily entries that describe events throughout middle Tennessee during the war years along with monthly pictures (archival and modern) of local places of Civil War importance.

The 10" by 14" calendar is a top quality, professional piece of reference material. We think of the calendar more as a short reference work with pictures rather than just a standard calendar. We believe people will keep it for its pictures and captions long after its use as a calendar has ended.


This year's 2000 calendar has all different pictures from the 1999 calendar. The group plans to revise and publish the calendar annually as an ongoing educational and fund raising project. The proceeds from the sale of the 2000 calendar will be used to help pay down the mortgage on the Carter cotton gin property that was purchased some time ago by the Heritage Foundation. The cotton gin site was the epicenter of the Battle of Franklin November 30, 1864.

As part of the group's public education outreach, two copies of the 2000 calendar have been donated to 106 public libraries in middle Tennessee for use in their reading rooms. The public is encouraged to review and read the calendar when they next visit their local public library.

As was done last year, the calendar will be sold in several Hallmark shops in the area as well as museums, gift shops, and bookstores in the Brentwood, Franklin and Nashville

area. And weather permitting, the group will have Saturday calendar booths at several local Kroger stores in that area.

The public can place mail orders at \$13 per calendar plus \$2.95 per order for shipping and handling by writing to: STFB, PO Box 851, Franklin, TN 37065-0851. The calendar can also be ordered at our web site at www.franklin-stfb. org.

Additionally, last year's 1999 calendar can still be ordered for \$4 per copy. Many do so just to have its sharp, large format, computer enhanced pictures including the Carter cotton gin (c.1875) and the 1899 Dedication of the Confederate Soldier Monument at the Franklin Town Square. At the Franklin Bicentennial celebration and at a recent Civil War Show in Smyrna, the group sold nearly as many 1999 calendars as the new 2000 calendar.

Save The Franklin Battlefield, Inc is a non-profit, tax-exempt organization of volunteers whose goal is to COM-plement the efforts of the local governments, and of other dedicated historical groups to preserve, protect, and promote Civil War sites in Williamson County. STFB members and prospective members meet with the Board of Directors at 6:30PM on the second Monday of each month at the Williamson County Library. The public is invited to visit the monthly Board Meetings.
