Save the Franklin Battlefield, in conjunction with the Brentwood Historical Society, will sponsor it's first driving tour of 2000. A tour of the battlefield sites in the Brentwood Area is planned for Sunday afternoon March 19, 2000 between the hours of 2pm and 5 pm. Tickets should be obtained at the Ramparts Building in Brentwood on the corner of Franklin Road and Maryland Way and should be picked up anytime before 4pm. You will be given a map of the battlefield sites which you may then visit at your leisure. Interpreters will be stationed at each site to explain the site to you when you arrive. If you are not familiar with this particular event of the Civil War, you are certain to find this tour both entertaining and informative. The cost for the tour will be free to members of either STFB or the Brentwood Historical Society, and \$5.00 to the general public. Students and children are \$2.00.

Letter from Franklin



My Own Dear Sisters,

Camp Near Tuscumbia Dec. 27th, 1864 Tuesday Night

My last letter was from near Nashville giving a detailed account of our trip to that point. Since then we have met with disasters of which you have probably heard before this.

Thursday Dec. 15. The enemy attached our right & were repulsed this morning but in the evening they attached our left in heavier force & drove that part of our line for 1 ½ miles & captured part of the artillery of Stewart's Corps. It was very unexpected to us. I went out to Franklin this morning & spent the night at Maj. McEwen's Aunt Martha's.


Friday Dec. 16. The enemy attacked us in heavy force today & the fight lasted 'till 3 or 4 o'clock when Bate's Division broke and our line gave way. I left Franklin to the front & met the head of our column. (page 2) beyond Brentwood retreating. The pike was filled with wagons, ambulances, Artillery horses, men to. No organized Command. At Brentwood guards were placed & the stragglers turned back. Everything was mixed up but still there was no panic. Everything was mixed up but still there was no panic. All were moving quietly. The enemy did not press their advantage as well as they might have done. Yesterday & today we lost 59 pieces of Artillery—of this our Corps lost 14. Everything was hurried to Franklin. Our loss in killed and wounded is light. That of the enemy heavier. Very little of the artillery was captured by charging it, but when our line broke they were in the rear of the artillery & it being rough country (we) could not bring it off. Many of our best batteries were captured. Maj. Genl. Ed Johnson was captured. Brig. Gen Sears had his leg amputated. Brig. Gen. Tom Smith of WmSon. Co. was captured.

Saturday Dec 17. We moved to Columbia today. Our rear guard had heavy fighting from Holly Tree Gap back. A large portion of ______ Regt. Cavalry was captured, also the 4th & 30th (page 3) Regt's. La. Infantry. The enemy occupied Franklin about 12 o'clock to-day. Douglass's Battery was captured 4 miles this side of Franklin.

<u>Sunday</u> Dec. 18. Remained at Columbia today getting the trains & everything across the river. Several pieces of Artillery were left on the other side ont being able to get them over.

Monday Dec. 19. Marched near Pulaski to-day. It rained all day & towards night. It froze on the trees & continued raining all day towards night it froze on the trees & continued raining. We did not get into camp till after dark & then it was snowing. It has been a very unpleasant few days & ton-night is decidedly the worst night of the campaign. I ______ such a night, not since leaving Virginia.

Plans are underway to print the STFB Day-by-Day calendar for the year 2001. This will be the third time in as many years that STFB has published this striking day-by-day chronicle of Civil War events in Williamson County and Middle Tennessee. The calendar has become one of STFB's best public education methods to promote the need to have a battlefield park at Franklin.

We expect to have the 13 new pictures and revised text to the printers by June 1 for delivery by August 1. That also means we have to have the project funding completed in May so that the production contracts can be signed.

This year we hope to remove the past funding delays to our production schedule by enlisting 20-30 corporate and individual sponsors to cover most of the expected \$15,000 publishing expense. Irish Confederate Memorial Service

The third annual Irish Confederate Memorial Service will be held on Sunday March 12th at 2 p.m., at Mt. Olivet Cemetery in Nashville. This cemetery holds many Irish soldiers, predominately from the 10th Tennessee Infantry, who spent their final years at the nearby Old Soldiers' Home. Military reenactors and pipers will be in attendance, and STFB member--and former board

member--Thomas Cartwright will be the featured speaker. The Irish Confederate Memorial Service is held annually on the Sunday before St. Patrick's Day, and is sponsored by the Tod Carter and Randal McGavock Camps of the Sons of Confederate Veterans. It is free to the public.
