#### Letter from Franklin



(Confederate Veteran Magazine, Vol. XVI, (1908), #11, (Nov.), page 554, article by J. K. Merrifield, 88th Illinois Infantry, USA & Medal of Honor Recipient for actions at the Battle of Franklin, TN.)

"The battle of Franklin, in my opinion, was one of the most desperate of the Civil War . . . I have talked this battle over with . . . . F. M. Cockrill. Of Missouri, who was a (Confederate) Brigade Commander there and was wounded. He agrees with thousands of others that Franklin, Tenn., November 30, 1864, was the worst 'Slaughter Pen' and most bitterly contested of all our battles with more loss of life on the Confederate side for the number engaged than any battle of the war."

#### **News In Review**

Students offer support for stone walls-Williamson AM-Two Williamson County women have enlisted the aid of their students at Walnut Grove Elementary School to have the area's historic stone walls protected by legislation pending before the State Legislature. Laura Turner and Debbie Layman are working to get House Resolution 492 thorough the Legislature's committee system before a vote by the State Senate.

The bill asks the Tennessee Historical Commission to document "stone walls worthy of preservation and to develop criteria for their protection and preservation, including standards for moving and rebuilding such walls when other alternatives are not available."

"I first became aware of the need to somehow protect the walls and roads in our area when the widening of Old Natchez Trace initiated three years ago. I was amazed to learn that there was

no protection of any kind that could assist in the preservation of the historic road and surrounding walls and hedgerows," said Ms. Layman.

By working together and talking to officials, the women learned that other states had enacted legislation supporting the stone walls and their preservation. In Kentucky, legislation was enacted which now requires the moving and rebuilding of stone walls threatened by development. One county in Kentucky lost 25 percent of the stone walls around it's horse and family farms between 1967 and 1990.

Debbie Layman also asks that anyone who has a dry stone wall on their property or who knows of a wall which should be included on Williamson County's list, to call The Heritage Foundation at 591-8500.

## STFB 2001 Calendar Looking Iffy

STFB Board meetings for March and April, the board reviewed the possibility to again publish the STFB Day-by-Day calendar for the year 2001. The calendars list several hundred daily events that occurred in Middle Tennessee during the war years. Each month also features a picture of a local Civil War location or preservation theme with descriptive sidebar text.

The past two calendars have been excellent public education and promotional pieces for STFB's efforts, and most of the text material can be used from one year to the next with some revision plus all new pictures. In order to have the finished calendars by September, the print materials and the financing have to be completed by June 1, 2000.

The 1999 and 2000 calendars were on average break-even propositions and represented a large workload for the all-volunteer staff.

Even though the calendars are out-of date, they do continue to sell well at STFB booths at local festivals and historical gatherings. This is because of they are actually picture history books, rather than just calendars.... and the computer enhanced pictures are spectacular.

For the 2001 calendar, we had hoped for businesses to help sponsor the \$15,000 printing cost in exchange for advertising space on the back cover. To date, STFB has not received sponsor commitments, and thus may have to forego producing a calendar for 2001.
