McGavock Confederate Cemetery Illumination Tour

STFB will conduct an evening illumination tour of the McGavock Confederate Cemetery at Carnton Plantation on Friday, October 27. The tour will run continuously between 5:30 p.m. and 8:30 p.m. Last year we raised over \$1200 for the upkeep of the cemetery, and we hope to have an even better turnout this year.

In the weeks and months following the Battle of Franklin, an ever-expanding forest of grave markers sprouted up around Franklin as soldiers died of their wounds and disease. John and Carrie Winder McGavock, owners of Carnton Plantation, donated two acres of ground adjacent to their family cemetery for the proper re-internment of Franklin's Confederate dead. With nearly 1500 graves, organized by state, and including 225 "unknowns," the McGavock Confederate Cemetery is the largest privately owned Confederate cemetery in the country and is open daily for visitors.

Tour guides will lead small groups of visitors to various locations in the cemetery, where military and civilian reenactors will present biographical sketches of the soldiers buried there. Admission is \$5, Seniors \$3, and Students \$2. The proceeds for this event will be donated to Franklin Chapter #14, United Daughters of the Confederacy, for their perpetual upkeep and maintenance of the cemetery.

From 1861-1865 By an Old Johnnie – Personal Recollections and Experiences in the Confederate Army by Captain James Dinkins –

Promoted to lieutenant of cavalry in April 1863 at the age of eighteen he went to Mississippi to serve as aide-de-camp to General James R. Chalmers. When Chalmers command became part of Nathan Bedford Forrest's cavalry in January 1864, Dinkins therefore had the opportunity to closely observe Forrest for he participated in most of Forrest's raids and campaigns throughout the rest of the war.

Dinkins died July 19, 1939 at the age of 94 in North Carolina. Part of his account of the Battle of Franklin written thirty years later "as a record for his descendants and friends to read in after years."

From his account I quote, "We revere the memories of the distinguished dead, the privates not less than the generals. The men, who gave up their lives at Franklin on the confederate side, were martyrs to a hopeless cause. They felt regret at the lost opportunity at Spring Hill (not their fault), and went blindly forth to retrieve the errors, and were willing to redeem the mistakes of their officers with their lives, if necessary. We cannot over estimate their noble and heroic deeds. Every American citizen should feel a pride in cherishing the memory of the gallant men who stormed the works at Franklin, as well as those who defended them"

"When daylight dawned on Franklin, Tennessee, December 1, 1864, the scene was indescribable. About five thousand Confederates and two thousand Federals lay dead or wounded in and around the Federal breast works. In many instances, Confederates and Federals lay across each other, and there was one case where a Confederate and a Federal were found dead in the ditch, the Confederate grasping the Federals throat. General Schofield retreated about 2 am, leaving his dead and wounded in our hands, our army was badly whipped. The men knew that no earthly good had been accomplished, and that the flower of the army had fallen. They had hoped for brilliant results in Tennessee, but met disaster.

They could never again look into the faces of the noble men, the pride and glory of so many battles, who lay dead upon the field at Franklin, and their hearts were filled with gloom and sorrow. And this was the condition of Hood's army as it moved toward Nashville."
