Williamson County School Board Plans to Build New School Across from the Harrison House

"Franklin, Tennessee, September 11th, 1865

Mr. Rollin H. Kelly,

Dear Sir.

I take a sad pleasure in giving you the information desired in reference to the death and burial of your noble and gallant brother, General Kelly. He fell leading the charge. The fatal bullet entered just below the right shoulder and ranging downward entered the right lung. Of course we were forced to leave him, but I am glad to be able to say that he was tenderly cared for for as long as he lived after the fatal wound. He lived several days. He had the best medical attendance and nursing. 'Was very decently buried in a metallic coffin, purchased by the citizens of this place. New clothes were put upon him with the exception of his coat, it was thought best that he should be buried in the uniform coat he wore when he fell.

Allow me to mourn with you for his loss. I honer him as an officer and loved him as a brother. No braver soldier ever faced a foe - no truer gentleman ever walked the earth.

He was buried in the burial ground of Wm. H. Harrison, five miles from here, on the Columbia Pike.

Respectfully, W.S. McLemore"

The letter above refers to the gallant young General John Herbert Kelley, C.S.A., who, while leading a charge on Federal Troops just south of Franklin, Tennessee, August 20, 1864, was mortally wounded and died shortly thereafter at The Harrison House. Kelly was a brilliant young general, and was the youngest man ever to attain that rank in the course of the war... he was just 24 years old at the time of his death! The action in which he was killed occurred just south of Winstead Hill, south of Franklin, and east of the Columbia Pike, today known as Highway 31. At the very time this article is being written, the land where gallant General Kelley was killed is being considered to be the site of a new school. Not only would construction and development on this site desecrate this hallowed battlefield, it would further ruin the "view shed" of the historic Harrison House. This ground is sacred. Brave Americans died on this plot of ground. What message are we sending to future generations by building *anything* on this sacred soil? It should clearly be left undeveloped, and the school should be constructed elsewhere. Please join with the Save The Franklin Battlefield, Inc. group in letting Franklin city officials know that you are opposed to this endeavor, especially those of you who live in Williamson County. Thank you!

Stones River National Battlefield is Again the Scene of Attack

Not by Union or Confederate armies, but by unprecedented growth and development. The Tennessee Department of Transportation has proposed an I-24 interstate interchange at Manson Pike. It has also been proposed to widen Manson Pike.

If the proposals come to fruition, large parcels of historically significant land will become more attractive for commercial development and the area surrounding Stones River National Battlefield will be developed.

There were 51 petitions signed by members and associates of the Friends of Stones River National Battlefield presented to Richard Reeves, Mayor of Murfreesboro and the City Council. These petitions requested that Murfreesboro's leadership consider carefully all alternatives available for improving Manson Pike from Thompson Lane to I-24, including the lasting impact of locating an interchange near the battlefield.
