STFB Tours for 2006

We are planning to have three battlefield tours this year for STFB members and the general public. The dates for the later events are still in flux, so watch the newsletter and web site for details.

Our first event will be a tour of the Triune Earthworks on April 01, from 1-3 pm. These extensive earthworks were built by the Federal army in the spring of 1863 as part of their advanced line stretching from Franklin, Triune, and Murfreesboro. Fred Prouty, historian with the Tennessee Historic Commission, will lead the tour. This is an "over-the-hills" tour so be prepared to walk about a mile or more.

We will meet at 12:30 at the parking lot on the northeast corner of the Highway 96 crossroads in Triune, and then caravan the short distance to the tour site. This tour is on private lands and is scheduled only every few years.... so mark your calendars for this rare chance to see the Triune. Please RSVP to 500-6612. We will have more information about this event in next month's newsletter.

On Saturday, May 13, STFB will have a booth at the annual Thompson's Station Festival from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.. As part of this event, we are scheduling short tours of the Thompson's Station Battlefield at 1:00 p.m. and 4:00 p.m. for STFB members and the visiting public. Those tours will be conducted at the Train Depot and caboose in 'downtown' Thompson's Station. The tour will be done at that location and will not involve walking. Watch for more details in future newsletters.

On a Saturday morning in late August, we are planning to hold a tour of McGavock's Grove (the former golf course) in Franklin and discuss the Battle of Franklin events that took place on this newly designated Franklin Battlefield Park. Williamson County Historian Rick Warwick will lead the tour and discuss new discoveries concerning this site. We will keep you informed as the schedule and details firm up.

Eastern Flank Celebration

On February 7th, the City of Franklin hosted an event on the Eastern Flank property to celebrate the acquisition of 112 acres of core Franklin battlefield, and to publicly thank the many individuals and organizations that brought the project from dream to reality.

Franklin Mayor Tom Miller thanked the city staff and local preservationists, and served as master of ceremonies for the event. Rod Heller, previous owner of the land, thanked the Franklin Mayor and Aldermen for accepting his preservation challenge. Franklin's Charge's Julian Bibb spoke to the effects of some 500 citizens and groups, including STFB and its members, who donated to the project. Paul Hawke, director of the American Battlefield Preservation Project of the National Parks Service, thanked the community for their vision, and promised further funds to help develop the property to NPS standards. Finally, Doug Brouder, representing the Civil War Preservation Trust, spoke of the value of the land as a true memorial to the men, both North and South, who fought across the landscapes of Franklin.

A reception was held in the former country club, with almost the entire STFB board and numerous members in attendance. Later that evening, Franklin's Charge held a thank you reception across the field at Historic Carnton Plantation. It was a fitting way to celebrate the hard work and generosity of many, many folks to Save The

Old BGA? That's Academy Park to you — The Tennessean, "Williamson A.M." — 1/15/06 — FRANKLIN — Phyllis Huffman, the planning administrator for the Williamson County Parks & Recreation Department renamed the old Battle Ground Academy recreational Facilities "Academy Park." Huffman said she came up with "Academy" as a tribute to what the gyms used to be and "Park" because she thought the other parts of the campus "looked like a park with all of its green spaces."

Traces of former country club vanish — The Tennessean, "Williamson A.M." — 1/20/06 — FRANKLIN — Crews are ripping up part of a golf cart path and filling in the swimming pool at the Country Club of Franklin, milestones in the conversion of the former golf course to its 1864 appearance when the Battle of Franklin raged. But the next steps in creating a battlefield park won't come until Jan. 23, when architectural firms turn in their proposals for how the 110-acre site would look upon completion.

Talks continue on turning old courthouse into city hall — The Tennessean, "Williamson A.

M." — 1/20/06 — FRANKLIN — The courtship between Franklin leaders and Williamson County officials over the city leasing the county's historic courthouse on Franklin Square is back on. City officials want to move out of Current city hall space and across the street to the county-owned antebellum courthouse, which is bigger, historic and probably needs millions of dollars in renovations and improvements.

Freedom Award going to Carter descendants — The Tennessean, "Williamson A.M." — 1/30/06 — FRANKLIN — Former slave owner F. B. Carter owned about 80 slaves who all lived on land surrounding the Columbia Avenue historic landmark. Before the Civil War, all of the slaves took on the last names of their masters. Carter gave all of his slaves their freedom in 1859, two years before the Emancipation Proclamation declared them free. Many of the former slaves remained in Franklin and purchased land; scores of their descendants still live in the area. Georgia Lane, David McLemore, and Stacey Lane, grandmother, son and grandson are descendants of freed slaves who took the Carter surname from slave owner F.B. Carter,

who owned the home at the center of the 1864 Battle of Franklin, will be given the Historic African-American Freedom Award at the fifth annual Black Tie Affair.

Carter House to receive capital improvements — Franklin Review Appeal — 2/1/06 — FRANKLIN — The proposed budget by Gov. Phil Bredesen includes additional funding for Tennessee's state-owned historic sites, highlighted by a \$1.25 million allocation for Franklin's Carter House. The capital improvement would fund the construction of a visitors' center with an interpretation area for the Carter House, a state-owned historical site in Franklin.

New developer has interest in buying development rights — The Tennessean, "Williamson A. M." — 2/3/06 — FRANKLIN — An agreement has been signed between a developer willing to purchase the development rights of a 25-acre piece of property near Harlinsdale Farm along Franklin Road and transfer them to a 23-acre site in another area. If this happens, the program would preserve the Franklin Road property near Harlinsdale while allowing its landowner to sell the development rights of that land.

Former BGA faculty houses bring in big money at auction — The Tennessean, "Williamson A. M." — 2/3/06 — FRANKLIN — Five dilapidated houses on Everbright Avenue that used to be home to the Battle Ground Academy headmaster and other faculty members were sold this week for enough money to retire the county's debt on the purchase of the former campus. One of the stipulations of the auction was that the homes must be renovated. The buyers have 18 months from the time of closing to complete the renovation.


Mayor believes criticism will fade, community will rally around battlefield park project — The Tennessean, "Williamson A.M." — 2/9/06 — FRANKLIN — Standing on the former golf course, Mayor Tom Miller told a crowd of about 100 supporters that he had been skeptical the deal could be pulled off, though it was important for preserving the area's heritage and open space. The meeting was to commemorate the sale from Washington, D.C., businessman Rod Heller to the city which was finalized Dec. 29. Miller conceded that detractors had questioned the land's historic importance to the Battle of Franklin, but that criticism eventually will fade once work on the project moves forward.


