Dear STFB member-

It is hard to believe that another year has passed bringing us again to November and the anniversary of the Battle of Franklin.

We have just hosted a wonderful group of descendants of the Battle of Franklin at Collins' Farm during The Carter House's 4th Descendants' Reunion. Thomas Cartwright and his staff did an amazing job giving 100+ folks from around the US a very meaningful and emotional weekend of activities. If you have an opportunity to attend in the future, I encourage you to do so.

Also this past month, STFB went on public record before the Williamson County Commission to encourage them to purchase 6.5 additional acres of the Battle Ground Academy campus in 5 parcels, and to leave them as open battlefield land. Newly elected County Executive Rogers Anderson spoke of nearby parcels already coming available for County purchase, and the desire to work together with the City of Franklin to purchase additional acreage. Reenactors' March For Collins Farm "40 For Franklin" November 15th - 16th, 2002

On November 15th & 16th, 2002, Civil War reenactors will be marching "Forty for Franklin" to help Save The Franklin Battlefield, Inc. The twentyone uniformed reenactors will be marching 40 miles over two days to raise funds to help retire the debt on Collins Farm in Franklin.

Collins Farm is an important 3.22 acres of the Franklin battlefield that STFB purchased in June 2001. The land is on the extreme east end of the main trench line where the river and railroad converge. This ground was traversed by General W W Loring's Division as they climbed the railroad embankment and got entangled in the osage orange abatis in front of the Federal trenches. It was this ground of which Lieutenant William H. Berryhill of the 43rd Mississippi lamented, "I cannot see how any human being could live two moments in such a place."

Each of the twenty-one reenactors will portray and represent one of the 18 Union and Confederate states that had regiments engaged at the Battle of Franklin on November 30, 1864. Missouri, Kentucky, and Tennessee had troops fighting in the battle on both sides, hence the number twenty-one. Other states represented will be Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, South Carolina, Texas, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and Wisconsin.

The reenactors will march 40 miles from Mt. Pleasant to Columbia along Highway 43, and from Columbia along Highway 31, encamping along the way, and into Franklin, ending up at the Collins Farm property on Lewisburg Pike.

STFB is encouraging groups and the general public to sponsor the reenactor representing the state of their choice on a "per mile" basis using the **"40 For Franklin" Sponsor Form**. The Tennessee Civil War Preservation Association September 2002 The Tennessee Civil War Preservation Association held its annual meeting in Franklin, TN in order to show support for the preservation efforts going on at this historic site. In spite of the loss in the nation-wide effort to relocate the site for the new library, the Civil War preservation community can claim one victory at Franklin: the Collins Farm. Committee OKs \$1M for BGA land *The Tennessean,* **"Williamson A.M." 10/2/02 FRANKLIN** County leaders are eyeing more property on Columbia Avenues Battle Ground Academy campus for a battlefield preservation park. With 12.7 acres under the county's belt, officials are considering buying between six and seven acres BGA plans to vacate next year. More than 130 descendants have signed up for the weekend, which includes: opening ceremonies; tours of McGavock Cemetery and the Spring Hill and Franklin battlefields Saturday afternoon; and a dinner at Harrison House. On Sunday, descendants from Maine to Oregon will gather for a service at Collins Farm, located on Lewisburg Pike, a hot spot of fighting during the battle.

James Allen Jackson, Sr.'s initial enlistment ended with his being captured and sent to a Yankee prison where he escaped and then rejoined to serve in Duckworth's 7th Tennessee Calvary unit, one of the escort units for Gen. County Buys Additional BGA Parcels

At its October 14 meeting, the Williamson County Commission approved the purchase of five additional parcels, totaling nearly eight acres, from the Battle Ground Academy. Three of the parcels are open spaces today and the other two have older homes that were at one time used for faculty residences and for student housing when BGA was a boarding school. The five properties border the west and south boundaries of the main BGA Campus on Columbia Avenue that is current owned by the county and is the site of the new Williamson County Library now under construction.

The county has no definite plans for the new parcels. Most of the commission discussion centered on perhaps using the ground to expand the open areas of the main campus or for a battlefield park.

In his pre-meeting remarks, STFB President Joe Smyth stated STFB support for the county's purchase and asked that new parcels be kept as open battlefield park. He reviewed the common preservation strategy of the many local groups that to-date have created six 'islands' of saved battlefield over the past 50 years -Winstead Hill park, Carnton Plantation, Collins Farm, Carter House, Fort Granger, and Ropers Knob. He stated that these individual 'islands' interpret various areas of the battlefield even though they were assembled over time from adjoining parcels owned by several different non-profit or government agencies.

Smyth also suggested to the commissioners that one of the existing BGA buildings should be used for a muchneeded Williamson County Museum, the current county archives, and a visitor orientation center. Smyth envisioned that the museum would have a significant Civil War section. With this use, the BGA Campus would become the seventh battlefield 'island' as the starting point for coordinated visit of the other six.

He further suggested that a common interpretation scheme for all seven 'islands' be developed so that eventually the appearance, tone, and style of interpretive materials for all seven locations would be more nearly uniform. He conceded that with so many different organizations, and budgets, involved with such a plan that the implementation would have to be gradual.

Battle of Franklin Reenactment—November 15—17

On November 15 - 17, more than 500 Civil War re-enactors will encamp at Historic Carnton Plantation in Franklin to commemorate the anniversary of the Battle of Franklin. The weekend schedule of events will include 19^{th} century civilian and military living history interpretations. Also to be featured are candlelight tours of the historic house, lantern tours of the McGavock Confederate cemetery, mock battles, medical reenactments, and military drilling and camp life demonstrations. A simultaneous cannon volley from Winstead Hill, Carnton Plantation, and Fort Granger will create a dramatic sound not heard by the citizens of Franklin since November of 1864. This event, the largest ever planned at Carnton, is being cosponsored by the Tod Carter Camp, Sons of Confederate Veterans.

Three Confederate battle flags, including a rare Hardee pattern flag carried at Franklin by the 1st & 15th Arkansas Infantry, will be on exhibit during the weekend. Authors Wiley Sword and Howard Bahr will be attending to sign copies of their books. Numerous sutlers will set up their tents on the grounds of the plantation all weekend offering foods and reproduction items that would have been available during the Civil War. The 5th Alabama Infantry Regimental Band, a 30-piece band in uniform dress will perform throughout the event and will play for a dance on Saturday evening. Re-enactors in military and civilian period dress will enjoy dancing to the War-era music. The public is invited to attend and can receive instruction in period dance steps. Dress is formal for the dance.

Daily admission for the event is \$10 for adults, \$5 for children ages 6 - 12, and under 6 are admitted free. Admission for the period dance on Saturday evening is \$5 per person. The grounds will open to the public at 9:00 a.m. on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, and will close at 7:00 p.m. on Friday and Saturday and 5:00 p.m. on Sunday. The dance will be held from 7:00 p.m. - 10:00 p.m. on Saturday.
